(Mr. Davis moved the adoption of the resolutions as read.)

The motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

Mr. Davis: There is one more resolution that came in too late to be considered by the committee; it was suggested by the paper presented on behalf of Mr. Nash by Mr. Tucker. I will read it:

WILDLIFE ON INDIAN LANDS

Whereas it is universally realized by persons well informed on the subject that there is a dire need for the initiation by the Bureau of Indian Affairs of a practical program for wildlife restoration and regulation on Indian reservations;

Now therefore be it resolved that the International Association of Game, Fish and Conservation Commissioners urge Congress to include a sufficient sum in subsequent Indian appropriation bills to enable the Bureau of Indian Affairs to initiate and vigorously execute a practical and effective plan for restoration and regulation of wildlife on Indian lands.

(Mr. Davis moved the adoption of the resolution;
the motion was seconded and carried unanimously.)

The Chairman: Mr. Quinn will now present the report of the Nominations Committee.

REPORT OF NOMINATIONS COMMITTEE

Mr. Quinn: The Committee on Nominations had occasion to investigate all precedents before selecting nominees to submit to you for your consideration for the election of the official family for the ensuing year. It is the custom, according to the records of the Secretary of the Association, that members of the Association who for any cause retire from the service of either the state or the Federal Government should necessarily be retired also from the roll of the official staff of the Association. The Committee expresses regret at its inability to elevate some who have previously appeared on the official list, but it could not be done without breaking the long-established custom and precedent of the Association.
